Uzbek Palo Rice Dish

1 onion
4 carrots cut julienne
½ kg meat (any kind)
50g tomato sauce
Long grain rice (amt. water depends on how many people)
1/2tsp. cumin seeds
Salt

The Unfailing Memory

Sangay still remembers that fateful day—a bright Saturday morning. The sun had just begun to glow from the horizon. Children were playing in puddles of water. One could hear the chirping of insects and birds. And the sweet aroma of hibiscus flowers filled the air.


It was an uncomfortable memory for a 12-year-old girl whose only surviving parent was abducted and killed by rebel forces during the Liberian civil war. Her mother had died a day after giving birth to Sangay. That was 12 years ago. Today, she lives with a distant cousin in Abidjan, Ivory Coast, as a refugee. Sangay, now in her 20s, relates her story in ways that prick the human emotions. It's one that shows the dark side of humanity. Civil conflicts in Africa abound with such horrifying, gory stories of unrestrained brutality, rape and the cold-blooded murders of innocent, unarmed people. Over 300,000 people died in the Liberian civil conflict, which lasted for 15 years. Nearly half a million people were displaced in the country. Another million became refugees in African, North American and European countries. It was one of Africa's deadliest civil conflicts, then.

It's now 16 years since the Liberian war ended, and peace is still shaky—and elusive. Many people, including Sangay, are still trapped in refugee camps, where conditions get worse day in, day out. That's what violent conflict does to a people—a whole nation. It destroys people's capacity to improve their lives. It hijacks people's creative energies and reduces them to subhuman. Bad memories linger in people's minds, and hope turns to despair and hate.

In many ways, Sangay's situation symbolizes the plight of victims of civil conflicts in Africa and other developing countries. It's hard for them to forget those bad memories for they never seem to go away. And Sangay does not forget that ill-fated Saturday morning when her father was taken away amidst wailing and pleads for mercy.

Q: You have lots of experience in teaching. How do you see this program for newcomers?

A: This program is essential for newcomers because they "must" know English in order to function adequately in the work place and to integrate into the Canadian culture.

Q: Do you think this program is better and faster for learning?

A: I do not think there is any program better or faster for learning because how fast a person learns is relative to many factors such as: academic background, motivation, personal well being and personality. In addition, such things as classroom climate, pacing, and how the instructor makes the students relax are more relative to how a student progresses than any particular program he/she may be in. I believe that a student must be ready to learn and feel comfortable and relaxed in his/her learning environment. Furthermore, they must be able to see their progress from day to day but at the same time feel challenged and inspired. If an instructor loves his /her job, then this should rub off on his /her students.

Q: Do you see any difference between men and women's learning? What is your opinion?

A: I do not think there are any great differences between men and women's learning. Rather, I believe how one is motivated to learn is more important than what gender a student is. However, I have observed that female students, in general, seem to have many more outside responsibilities than their male counterparts. Many times these responsibilities cause female students to miss classes. This sometimes slows down their progress. In spite of this, women generally complete their assignments better and faster than men.
